Take the journey Jamie First

Crossing the border into Scotland, you stop at Edinburgh Castle and Loch Lomond, then back into England to see Beatrix Potter's house and the Honister Slate Mine.

Trips to the World Heritage-listed Caernarfon Castle and the Royal Welsh Showin Wales; Stonehenge in England; and a sightseeing tour of Dublin are also on the itinerary.

Alternatively, if you have the Continent in your sights, Swagman is offering a leisurely European three-river cruise in July.

Featuring the romantic Rhine and rock of Lorelei, the French battlefields and the Camargue and Ardeche Gorges, this 25-day trip is ideal for those who like to look around in style.

Starting in Strasbourg, France, passengers will cruise the Rhine's tributaries, and visit several Germann towns in shore visits.
